Although with IELTS task 2 the task will vary, they follow 5 common task-types. First it is important to identify what the task is asking you to do and construct your answer accordingly. Here are the 5 types, and this guide will provide a good structure for each one.

- a. Agree or disagree
- b. Describe advantages and disadvantages
- c. Discuss 2 points of view and give them yours
- d. Answer 2 questions
- e. Suggest solutions to a problem
